As we celebrate 10 years of the Zurich Flood Resilience Alliance, we talk with David Nash, Head of Climate Change at Z Zurich Foundation about the Alliance's successes so far, and Practical Action's role in it.

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We cannot stop the rain. We cannot stop the water. But we can help communities cope with the impacts."

David Nash

Head of Climate Change at Z Zurich Foundation

For supporters who aren't familiar with the Alliance, can you explain what it is?

The Zurich Flood Resilience Alliance is a partnership of nine organisations, including Practical Action. We work together to support vulnerable communities around the world in building their resilience to flooding.

What is the secret of the **Alliance's success?** Building a successful partnership relies on two things: a shared purpose, and trust. The Alliance came together around the aim that no-one, wherever they are in the world, would be negatively affected by floods.

Our willingness to learn from each other and contribute to a collective goal is the foundation of the trust between us. In my role in the Z Zurich Foundation, it's not always easy to accommodate nine different organisations, but this willingness means we

seek solutions and compromises that work for us all. By coming together, we create more than the sum of our parts.

What does Practical Action bring specifically to the mix?

Practical Action is one of several partners in the Alliance that work directly with communities. One of their greatest strengths is the deep knowledge and experience they have of developing early warning systems. This is particularly evident in their successes in Nepal and Peru.

However, this is only part of Practical Action's contribution. They have also been instrumental in developing the way learnings from across all the Alliance's work are collated and shared with the wider world, so the benefits impact many more people than we could ever work with directly.

In the ten years since the Alliance began, what have been its most important successes?

Together, we've helped around 1.1 million people improve their lives. One clear example of this has been in Peru. We've developed a new and improved approach to early warning systems centred around community-gathered data. This approach has been so successful that the local weather service has adopted it in their own nationwide approaches to early warning systems.

Following this, Practical Action helped encourage the government of Peru to invest significantly in flood resilience. Already, 457,000 people in Peru are benefitting from the early warning systems. The new investment is expected to improve the lives of over 9.3 million people.

Looking forward, what are the Alliance's ambitions and goals for the future?

The next stage of working together is, in part, inspired by our work in Peru – this idea of influencing wider systems, to scale our impact. Our plan is to expand the number of people we are working with massively over the next 12 years and create a real step-change in global resilience. The plan is ambitious, but built on a very solid foundation.

What's the most important thing you'd like Practical Action supporters to know about the Alliance?

The key thing to remember about the Alliance is that it embodies the idea that we can achieve more together than we ever can alone. The spirit of collaboration is a very human trait and one that has helped humans be successful over millennia – and it is one that helps us aim high.

In that spirit, I want to say a big thank you to Practical Action supporters for helping make this work possible. You are an essential part of the Alliance!

Financial cost

Your support is essential in making our work possible, so we think it's important that we share information about how we're spending your donations, and the impact that they're having for people around the world. We are as concerned as you about keeping our costs and environmental impact to a minimum. Small World costs around 75p per copy to print and post, but it is an important source of income for us and raises nearly four times what it costs to make.

Environmental impact

In printing the magazine, we work hard to ensure it's done in the most environmental way, while also being mindful of costs. We print on paper that comes from sustainable forestry, and the company that prints and sends the magazine offsets the carbon generated in its production through a partnership with the World Land Trust. We'll continue to seek out new ways to improve the process further.

Lourine believes in the value of hard work. In her home county of Homa Bay, Kenya, where unemployment is high, few people believe farming can work as a career. But every day, she shows them that with effort, hope grows from the ground.

Lourine is one of the thousands of young farmers we have worked with in Homa Bay, introducing new regenerative farming techniques. This is a way of farming that replenishes the health of the soil and minimises the impact on the environment.

She has put her training into action and created a circular farm where nothing goes to waste, and where she needs no chemical fertilisers or pesticides.

Three or four years back, if you grew green leafy vegetables, you would spray them with chemicals, but after the training, I can produce my own fertiliser from my vermiculture project. The earthworms break down food remains from the kitchen and make the soil very fertile."

Alongside nutritious leafy greens, Lourine grows fruits such as mangos and oranges, and she rears bees, fish and chickens. The waste from one part of the farm provides nutrients for the next part.



"This has brought a big change to my family. We save the money that we were going to use buying vegetables from the market. We now use it to pay school fees."

Lourine is keen to share her new skills with more women. Every month, more people come to her for training. She shows them how farming can be a rewarding job that creates an income and a future for the whole family.

"As a mother and as a woman farmer, I want to encourage my fellow women that hard work pays and there is nothing that comes easy. You just have to have passion for what you want to achieve in your life. You can thrive with knowledge and passion."



Help more communities take action together.



For people living in Thies Nord, Senegal, the rains mean worry. This is a poor area, and the homes haven't been built to cope with the increasing threat of floods. Aliou remembers the anxiety well:

"When we saw the rain, we were really stressed because we knew what would come after. There would be water everywhere, up to your knees. It would come inside the houses, inside the bedroom, and no one could go anywhere."

People had no means to clear the water, and it would stay for as long as two weeks. The standing water caused serious sanitation and health problems, which had the worst impact on children.

"We had plenty of times when the kids got diarrhoea from the water, and suffered from a skin condition."

Aliou has lived in Thies Nord all his life. This area is particularly prone to flooding, but the frequency and severity of floods here has increased dramatically, as it has across the whole of West Africa. Thirty years ago, this region experienced no more than two floods on average per year. Today, the average is more than eight floods a year.

Practical Action has been working with Aliou's community for three years as part of the Zurich Flood Resilience Alliance. We have supported people in



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forming flood brigades, creating early flood warning systems, and also providing training and new equipment for dealing with flood water. Aliou is taking action to build resilience and create hope.



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It is a huge relief. Before we got this training and equipment, we used to spend the whole day trying to pump out the water ourselves. Most of the people here are young so they can't afford to spend a day getting the water out of the community. Now we can do it within minutes and people can go back to their activities."

HOPE NEEDS HARMONY

Hum's community lives in the mountains of Nepal, seven hours' drive from the nearest town. Water availability used to be something that divided them. Now it brings them together.

"Before, we faced many challenges due to the absence of a water tank. We had leaks and blockages in the water pipes, leading to disruptions in water flow and disputes among people about water distribution."



Without a dependable water supply, the community were limited in what they could grow on their land. They were only able to grow hardy cereals like maize and wheat. Subsistence living like this was hard.

The community decided something needed to be done to improve their situation, so they came together and took action. With technical support from Practical Action,

they built a new water tank and laid pipes to share the water equally among everyone. A dependable water supply and new skills brought hope to the whole village.

After building this water tank, we have sufficient water for irrigation and have started vegetable farming. We are excited, energetic and determined to expand our farming further."

We shared new agriculture techniques with Hum and his neighbours, as well as advice on the most profitable vegetables to grow and how to demand better prices from local markets. They were able to shift from subsistence farming, to farming as a source of income.

Now that the people of Hum's village have experienced the many benefits of a reliable water supply, they take great care to keep it flowing.

"It's important for us not to become careless and irresponsible just because we have sufficient water supply. We must use it wisely and efficiently. In case there's a disruption in the water supply, we inspect and clean the water tank, as well as check the water source. Proper usage of water is essential."

A big thank you from Nepal



Your support has enabled us to work with nearly 6,000 Nepali farmers to turn the tables on climate change and create successful farms.



For farmers living in remote, mountainous Nepal, survival has always been an uphill battle. For women farmers the challenges are even greater, as their husbands have often moved to urban areas in search of work, leaving them to run the family home, looking after children and elderly relatives. Climate change is piling on further challenges, such as wetter monsoons, dryer dry seasons, and new crop diseases.

Back in 2021, Practical Action supporters donated \pounds 1.75 million to our Turning the Tables on Climate Change in Nepal appeal. This was matched by the UK government, and that money enabled an ambitious project to transform lives in three districts of rural Nepal: East Rukum, Rolpa and Dang.

You have supported 5,565 people so far (including 4,800 women) in taking action to create better futures for themselves. You have helped install new solarpowered irrigation systems to create a dependable water supply. You have helped people develop climate-resilient farming skills at newly established Climate Field Schools. And you have helped create more equality for women through increased business skills and confidence training.

The positive impacts of this work are already being felt. Laxmi, a farmer we worked with in Rolpa said:

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Before, we faced an acute water shortage. Irrigating the farms required fetching water from a spring source for about two hours to fill a bucket, which was very difficult. But thanks to the solar irrigation system, we now have plenty of water."



The ease of gathering water, plus new farming knowledge, has helped Laxmi boost the yields of her farm: "We used to cultivate one crop per year. But now, we can cultivate vegetables in two to three seasons annually. Solar irrigation

has encouraged us to be involved in vegetable production at a commercial scale. The vegetable production has helped us double our annual income."

Together for a cleaner Kisumu

Our new partnership with Riviera Travel will help tackle waste and improve the lives of thousands of people in one of Kenya's largest cities.

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In Kisumu, Kenya, plastic waste is a big problem, with tonnes discarded into the environment every day. It builds up, spilling into rivers and damaging the health of ecosystems. It makes people sick too, which has the greatest impact on children, affecting their growth and development.

We've partnered with Riviera Travel, a curated tour and river cruise operator, to create a solution. They have decided to make a donation to Practical Action for every booking they receive, and this will fund an exciting new two-year project.

We will provide training and safety equipment for over 300 informal waste workers. We'll help them form co-operatives, which will ensure fairer pay, and turn their work into a respected local service.

Together with waste workers and local government, we'll create an effective waste management system. We'll also encourage attitude and behaviour shifts across the city. Dealing with waste and increasing recycling will become part of daily life, where everyone plays a role in making their home city a cleaner, healthier place to live.
